I feel that I have provided outstanding customer service and gained customer loyalty. I also feel that I have earned respect and loyalty from my Brothertown family as well respecting those in return.



I began as a dancer shortly after joining the Tribe and have served as lead dancer at our Pow Wows on a couple of occasions. One time, it was at one of our big Homecoming Pow Wows at the Fond du Lac Fair Grounds. I first began to attend Tribal Council Meeting when they were held once a year in Gresham, Wisconsin. June Ezold was our Chairperson and we met in the tiny American Legion Clubhouse Post 390 on Main Street in Gresham. Those meetings filled the building to capacity. Gresham, Wisconsin is the hometown of my Brothertown Family. My uncle, Curly Robinson was an active member of the Tribe.

For over 34 years, I worked as a Stewardship Ecologist. Based on my professional experience in natural resources, I was chosen to represent Brothertown at the UW Native Nations Summit on Environment and Health in Madison on March 12-13, 2015. This also inspired me to attend every one of the in person and zoom meetings of the Intertribal Lake Winnebago Wild Rice Project. I enjoy helping represent Brothertown. I've participated at the Celebrate CommUNITY event at the Fond du Lac Fairgrounds and participated in our Water Walk in 2019.
