**Journey of the Mohican Nation, Stockbridge-Munsee Band**  
**1734**—move to Stockbridge, Massachusetts  
**mid 1780s**—move to Brothertown, New York

**1822–1829**—some groups of Mohican settle at Grand Cacklin  
**1834**—Mohican and Brothertown families move to eastern shore of Lake Winnebago, near Fond du Lac  
**1856**—Stockbridge-Munsee Band of Mohicans signs treaty for reservation land in Shawano County

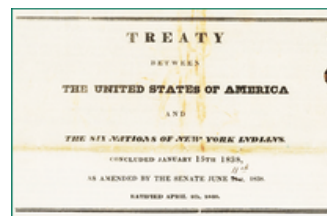

### Commuck, Thomas, 1804 - 1855

Born in 1804, Thomas Commuck, the son of farmington counselor Joseph Commuck, grew up in Charlestown, Rhode Island. There he attended a missionary school and developed an interest in reading. Around 1824, he moved to Brothertown, New York where he married Margaret Anne, an Eastern Piquet, in 1827. That same year, the couple moved to the new Brothertown community at Green Bay, Wisconsin where they started a family of what would be ten children. In Wisconsin, Commuck served as the community's first postmaster, justice of the peace, and historian. In 1844, the Milwaukee Courier reported that the Wisconsin Whig Party had nominated Commuck as a candidate for the Territory's House of Representatives.

A large talent, in 1838 he began to work on putting together a collection of music, a "number of airs which have been long in use among the Brothertown Indians." Seven years later, in 1845, Commuck published Indian Melodies, a collection of 122 hymns presented in single note or sacred harp notation. The work is possibly the earliest musical publication by a Native American composer. He published "Songs of Calumet County" for the Wisconsin Historical Society in 1854, and in the summer of following year, in correspondence with the Society's secretary, Lyman C. Draper, Commuck produced a short history of his community, published four years later as Sketch of the Brothertown Indians. Unfortunately, during the winter at the end of 1855, Commuck fell through the ice near his residence at Charlestown, Wisconsin and drowned.

LETTER from J--h J--n, one of the Mohegan Tribe of Indians, to his Countryman, Moses Paul, under Sentence of Death, in New-Haven-Goal.

Mohegan, in New-London County, A.D. 1772, March 29.  
M I dare follow travel to a vast country, I have seen one world, I go on before, I have by the name of J--n, a native of this land and of the Mohegan tribe. I am one who can truly say for your endeavor, but I was fore-ordained by an all-wise God, and by you I am to be his faithful servant, not who knows what God has ordained by it, perhaps to the good of your immortal soul.

My dear fellow mortal, I am so content that there is a God for us to do a being of a God, thus we for we have been in a state of slavery, and he has created all things by the word of his power, and he preserves all things both in heaven and earth, and he preserves all things by his power, though we for him are, we do his will, and follow his word, I bring you diligence, yet he is glorified by us, or we by him, either by our good, bad, or evil, or our sin, and from the great God's hand we see the deliver, who will be to us the first, more can deliver or place out of his hands.

And the first deliver, that this great God is a being with the wicked every day. And he makes a dismal place of torment to put the wicked in, which is a place of a place prepared for the devil and his angels, and it is here with unspeakable fire and brimstone, where God Almighty makes himself known by the display of his eternal wrath which is poured upon the wicked, without the least mixture of mercy. I for we hear of such a place, but do

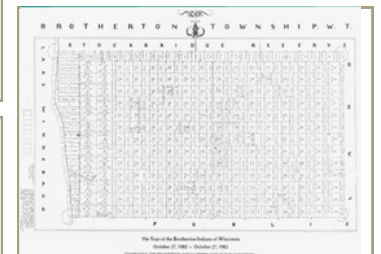

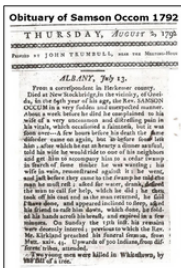

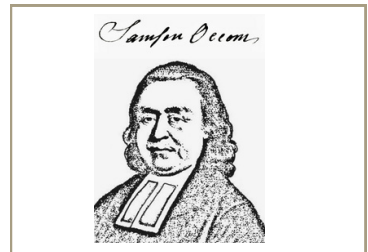

## Sketch of the Brothertown Indians

By Thomas Commuck

MASSACHUSETTS, Wm. August 22d, 1855.  
LUTHER C. DRAKE, Esq., Cor. Sec. State Historical Society, Wisconsin.  
Sir—My means of furnishing interesting information, such as would be acceptable to the State Historical Society of Wisconsin, being extremely limited, I have thought that it would not be wholly uninteresting to give a small sketch of the Brothertown Indians, who, as you probably are well aware, are now enjoying all the rights, privileges, and immunities of citizenship, and who now, as a part and parcel of that heterogeneous mass of human beings, of almost "all nations, tongues, and kindreds," who have happily chosen Wisconsin as their "Home, Sweet Home!" and although the sketch may contain many grammatical errors (the writer never having studied that branch of English education), still, it is hoped, that you will be able to comprehend it.  
It is a well known fact in American history, that at the time of the landing of the Pilgrims Fathers at Plymouth Rock, there were several powerful Indian tribes inhabiting the Atlantic coast in the state of Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, and New York. It is equally well known, that some and

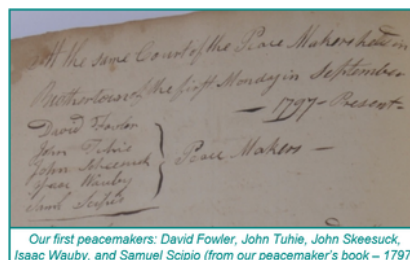

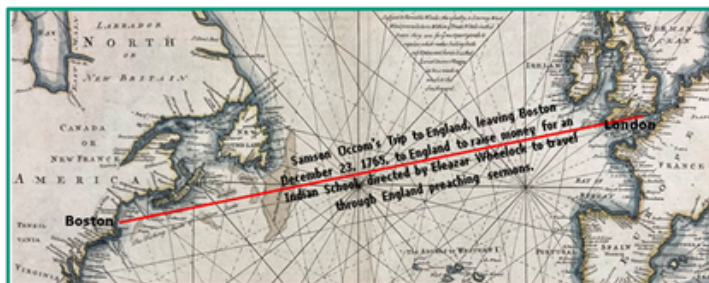
